# Grenada Jazz Program Enjoys Another Successful Year

In addition to community events, school concerts, and daily rehearsal the jazz band program in the Grenada School District enjoys a healthy level of competition. This past year the band drastically expanded their jazz program and in just a short amount of time has seen great benefit from it. In the 2012-2013 school year GHS had one jazz band with 18 students. This past year the high school has expanded to two high school bands of 18 and 15 students respectively and a middle school band of 30. The band program as a whole has seen good results from the individual practice of these students because it takes rigorous self-discipline to learn a new art like jazz.

The jazz bands performed in four different school performances and three different festivals in two states. The top jazz ensemble, GHS Jazz Ensemble I, competed in the University of Memphis Jazz Festival, where they were just one of two schools who received all superior ratings. Later in the year all three jazz ensembles traveled to Vicksburg, Mississippi to participate in the 34th annual Alcorn State Jazz Festival, which included world phenomenon trumpeter Arturo Sandoval. And last but not least, the GHS Jazz Ensemble II and the GMS Jazz Band traveled to New Albany, Mississippi, to participate in the annual Tallahatchie River Jazz Festival where both groups received all superior ratings.

The staff for Grenada Bands is extremely proud of the accomplishments and hard work of these young students and their diligence in becoming better well rounded musicians.

# GSD Mandatory Dress Code

## General Guidelines

Students are to be in compliance with the dress code policy including proper grooming and neatness before entering the building and at ALL times on campus and school buses. The principal will determine what constitutes distracting influences in the matter of dress and grooming and reserves the right to make modifications as needed. Altering the policy in any way is prohibited. If a style of dress or appearance is, in the opinion of the administration, disruptive to the educational process, constitutes a potential threat to the safety or health of the student or other persons, is unusually provocative, or contradicts the intent of the policy, it shall not be permitted. The District's dress code is established to teach hygiene, instill discipline, and prevent and avoid safety hazards.

## General Dress Code Data

- The construction would be of high quality, wash-n-wear, or permanent press fabric.
- Shirts would be worn tucked into pants, skirts, or shorts.
- All clothing would fit appropriately. Oversized and extremely tight fitting clothing would be prohibited.
- No head coverings of any type would be allowed including, hats, caps, bandanas, and sunglasses
- No fabric should have holes or be frayed
- No leggings
- No boots with shorts, skirts, or skirts

\*Clothing, jewelry, or other ornamentation advertising or depicting drugs, alcohol, tobacco, gang symbols, profanity/obscenities, or that which is sexually suggestive is prohibited.

\*\*All questions relating to the mandatory dress code shall be determined by each school principal.
